Northbound, from Manhattan East Side: FDR Drive North over Willis Ave. Bridge to Major Deegan Expressway North to NY State Thruway North to Saw Mill River Parkway North to exit marked "Saw Mill River Road- Eastview". Make right onto Saw Mill River Road. Make right at the second light. Building is on the right.

Northbound, from Long Island: Whitestone Bridge into the Bronx, then bear left off the bridge to the Hutchinson River Parkway North. Take northbound Hutchinson River Parkway to I-287 West (Cross Westchester Expressway) to Saw Mill River Parkway North. Take northbound Saw Mill Parkway to exit marked "Saw Mill River Road Eastview". Make right onto Saw Mill River Road. Make right at the second light. Building is on the right.

Southbound from upstate NY: I-684 or Taconic State Parkway South to Saw Mill River Parkway South to exit marked "Saw Mill River Road- Eastview". Make left onto Saw Mill River Road. Make right at the second light. Building is on the right.

Eastbound from New Jersey: New York State Thruway across Tappan Zee Bridge to Route 287 East. (Cross Westchester Expressway) to Exit 1, "Saw Mill River Parkway-North". Stay on Saw Mill River Parkway for approximately two miles to exit marked "Saw Mill River Road-Eastview". Make right onto Saw Mill River Road. Make right at the second light. Building is on the right.

Westbound from Connecticut: From Route 287 West, take Exit 3 onto Sprain Brook Parkway North to exit marked "100C-100 Eastview". Go left on Route 100C approximately one mile. LIBERTY ACQUIRES VAUGHN & HARTLEY

In a three-way trade with the Washington Mystics and Seattle Storm, the Liberty acquired center Kia Vaughn and guard Bria Hartley from the Mystics, while trading center Carolyn Swords to the Seattle Storm. The Storm also sent their 1st round pick to the Mystics. For Vaughn, it is her 2nd stint with the Liberty, as she was originally drafted by New York and played for the team from 2009-13, posting career bests of 10.1 ppg and 6.7 rpg in 2011. She has career averages of 6.5 ppg and 4.5 rpg. Hartley, a former standout at the University of Connecticut where she spent three years as a teammate of Kiah Stokes, boasts career averages of 7.1 ppg and 2.4 apg, while shooting .317 from 3-point range.

NY STATE OF MIND

The Liberty has a very New York-centric roster, with four players hailing from either one of NYC's five boroughs or Long Island. Tina Charles (Queens), Epiphanny Prince (Brooklyn), Kia Vaughn (Bronx), and Bria Hartley (Long Island) are all from New York. The connections do not stop there, as Prince, Vaughn, and Hartley all played for the Exodus AAU program, while Vaughn and Prince went on to become teammates collegiately at Rutgers, helping guide the Scarlet Knights to the NCAA Championship game in 2007.

NEW YORK DRAFTS ALLEN AND JAMES

The Liberty selected Notre Dame point guard Lindsay Allen (2nd Round, 14th overall) and Florida State center Kai James (3rd Round, 34th overall) in the 2017 WNBA Draft. Allen, the ACC's all-time leader in assists with 841, started every game during her 4-year career with the Fighting Irish, leading them to a 139-10 overall record during that span. James is a 6-5 center out of Florida State that has appeared in 93 games over three seasons in Tallahassee. During the 2016-17 season with the Seminoles, she averaged 5.8 points and 3.4 rebounds per game, shooting an efficient .579 from the field.

FRANCHISE PLAYERS

New York has added a pair of all-time greats to its front office staff, tabbing both Swin Cash and Teresa Weatherspoon for new roles as Director of Franchise Development. For Cash, she becomes the first player in WNBA history to transition directly from a playing career into a role in a team's front office. The roles will have a footing in both basketball and business operations. Weatherspoon will continue in her role as the Liberty's Director of Player Development, but will see an increased presence in the franchise's off court and team business initiatives.

LATE ARRIVALS

The Liberty will have 5 players arriving late for the start of training camp due to overseas commitments with their international club teams. Kia Vaughn officially joined the team on April 29, after concluding her season with USK Praha in the Czech Republic, leading them to a league championship and a 4th place finish in the EuroLeague Women tournament. Epiphanny Prince and Amanda Zahui B are expected in the 1st week of May, with Zahui B finishing 4th in the Russian League and helping guide Orenburg to a quarterfinal appearance in the EuroLeague women, while Prince's Dynamo Kursk team won the EuroLeague tournament and are competing for the Russian Championship. Kiah Stokes and Shavonte Zellous play for Besiktas in Turkey and will report once their run in the league's playoffs is concluded.

PRESEASON SCHEDULE

This preseason New York will play three games, two at Mohegan Sun Arena and a 3rd at Columbia University. The Liberty will face the Los Angeles Sparks on Tuesday, May 2, at Mohegan Sun, and the Chicago Sky on Wednesday, May 3, at Mohegan. On Sunday, May 7, New York will host the Connecticut Sun at Levien Gymnasium on the campus of Columbia University. The event is exclusive for New York Liberty season ticket holders.

STATEMENT FROM PRESIDENT ISIAH THOMAS ON TANISHA WRIGHT

"I want to inform our fans that Tanisha Wright has decided she will take time away from the game to rest during the 2017 WNBA season. Tanisha has the full support of the New York Liberty organization as she does what is best for her health and future. Tanisha has played a pivotal role in all our success both on and off the court over the past two seasons, as a leader in the locker room and the community; she has been a tremendous ambassador for the WNBA and our franchise. We wish her all of the best as she takes time to rest and recover, and hope to see her back in a New York Liberty uniform in the future."

CHARLES NAMED 1ST TEAM ALL-WNBA

Forward Tina Charles was named All-WNBA First Team after leading the league in scoring and rebounding in 2016, becoming the first Liberty player in franchise history to receive 1st Team all-league accolades in consecutive seasons. Charles was named to the All-WNBA First Team for the fourth time in her career after leading the WNBA in scoring (21.5 ppg) and rebounding (9.9 rpg), joining Chamique Holdsclaw (2002) and Lauren Jackson (2007) as the only players to lead the WNBA in both categories in the same season. Charles, who finished second in the MVP balloting, also led the league in double-doubles (20).

CHARLES IN RAREFIED AIR

- In 2016 Charles became just the 3rd player in WNBA history to lead the league in scoring and rebounding with 21.5 points and 9.9 rebounds per game.
- Only Chamique Holdsclaw (2002) and Lauren Jackson (2007) had accomplished that feat previously, so Charles was the first to do so in nearly a decade.
- The only NBA players to lead the league in scoring and rebounding were Wilt Chamberlain, Bob Pettit, and Neil Johnston.
- The Liberty had never had a player lead the league in scoring or rebounding; Charles accomplished both in the same year
- Charles' 21.5 ppg average was a new single-season franchise record, eclipsing Cappie Pondexter's 21.4 ppg during the 2010 season
- Charles had never led the league in scoring, but she had previously led the WNBA in rebounding on three occasions, from 2010-12, which includes her Rookie of the Year (2010) and Most Valuable Player (2012) seasons.

DEFENSE STILL REIGNS

The Liberty is known as one of the top defensive teams in the league, and the 2016 season continued that trend as New York once again led the league in defensive field goal percentage (.413) and proved to be the toughest team to score on in the paint in the WNBA. New York saw its opponents shoot just .504 on shots inside of five feet, the next closest team would be Minnesota at .540, and the league average was .571. Controlling the paint proved to be key all season, as the Liberty saw 18 of its 21 wins come when it won points in the paint.

PRETTY SWEET RECORD

Nailing two more 3-pointers against Dallas on Sept. 11, Sugar Rodgers added to her franchise single-season record with 86 3-pointers, surpassing Shameka Christon's 2011 campaign of 78 makes from downtown. Rodgers finished 2nd in the WNBA in 3-pointers last season, trailing only Diana Taurasi who sunk 89, the 3rd most for a single-season in league history.

THE DOUBLE-DOUBLE MACHINE

Forward Tina Charles posted 20 double-doubles last season. With 22 points and 11 rebounds against Washington on Sept. 13, Charles recorded the 129th double-double of her career, second all-time in league history, and she has posted a double-double in 56.1 percent of her games played as a pro. Her career 10.1 rebounds per game are first all time, while her career scoring average of 17.8 ppg is 8th.

20-20 VISION

With its 92-70 win over the Phoenix Mercury on Sept. 3, the Liberty reached 20 victories for the second-straight season. It was just the second time in franchise history that New York has won 20 games in back-to-back seasons, as the Liberty is coming off a franchise record 23 wins in 2015. The last time New York reached that threshold in consecutive years was back in 2000-01.

CHARLES MAKES IT FOUR PLAYER OF THE MONTH WINS IN A ROW

Charles earned her fourth consecutive Player of the Month honor and her ninth overall, keeping ahead of Maya Moore for the most since the award's inception in 2010. Charles becomes the first player in league history to win Player of the Month for four-consecutive months. Additionally, dating back to last season, the previous six Eastern Conference Player of the Month Awards have gone to New York (Charles - July '15; Epiphanny Prince - August '15), making it the most consecutive honors awarded to one franchise in WNBA history.

JAMES L. DOLAN **EXECUTIVE CHAIRMAN,** **THE MADISON SQUARE GARDEN COMPANY**

James L. Dolan is Executive Chairman of The Madison Square Garden Company (MSG), a leading sports and entertainment company renowned for its world-famous arena complex, professional sports teams, entertainment properties and historic showplaces. Mr. Dolan also serves as Executive Chairman of MSG Networks Inc., which includes two award-winning regional sports and entertainment networks.

In his role at MSG, Mr. Dolan is responsible for the Company's overall growth strategy and oversight of all of its operations. He also serves as governor to the National Basketball Association and the National Hockey League on behalf of the New York Knicks and New York Rangers.

Throughout his tenure, Mr. Dolan has spearheaded a number of restoration projects to ensure the continued prominence of the Company's premier venues. Mr. Dolan was the catalyst for the restoration of the Company's cherished national landmark, Radio City Music Hall, in 1999, as well as the famed Beacon Theatre in early 2009. This was followed by the three-year, top-to-bottom transformation of the Madison Square Garden Arena, which was completed in October 2013. In January 2014, Mr. Dolan introduced a new strategy that centered on creating large-scale venues with a focus on music and entertainment – with the re-opening of the legendary Forum arena in Inglewood, California. In 2016, MSG announced an expansion of this strategy, with its plans for a brand new, state-of-the-art venue in Las Vegas. MSG's venues also include The Chicago Theatre, which was built in 1921 as one of the country's most opulent motion picture houses.

In addition to its portfolio of landmark venues, MSG owns and operates professional sports teams, the New York Knicks, Rangers and Liberty, as well as entertainment properties, including the Christmas Spectacular and New York Spectacular, both starring the Radio City Rockettes. MSG has also expanded its live offerings through investments in Boston Calling Events, which produces outdoor music festivals, and TAO Group, a hospitality group with globally-recognized entertainment dining and nightlife brands, and is part of strategic partnerships, including Azoff MSG Entertainment and Tribeca Enterprises.

Mr. Dolan has led MSG's response to local and national tragedies. He played a principal role in organizing several extraordinary benefit concerts, including "12-12-12," which raised more than \$50 million for the victims of Hurricane Sandy; "The Concert For New York City," which generated more than \$35 million in aid for 9/11 victims and heroes; and "From The Big Apple to The Big Easy," which raised nearly \$9 million for Hurricane Katrina relief. Mr. Dolan also supports both MSG's and MSG Networks Inc.'s ongoing commitment to the community, particularly through the Garden of Dreams Foundation, the non-profit charity that works with both companies to help children throughout the New York metropolitan area.

In addition to his oversight of MSG, Mr. Dolan also serves as Executive Chairman of MSG Networks Inc., which became a standalone media company following the 2015 spin-off of The Madison Square Garden Company. MSG Networks Inc. is comprised of MSG Network and MSG+, which together annually telecast approximately 500 live professional games, along with a comprehensive lineup of other sporting events, including college football and basketball, as well as critically-acclaimed original programming.

Mr. Dolan also served as Chief Executive Officer of Cablevision Systems Corporation from 1995 until June 2016, when the leading media and telecommunications company, which served as MSG's parent company until 2010, was sold to Altice. Prior to his role as Cablevision CEO, Mr. Dolan was chief executive officer of Rainbow Media Holdings, the former Cablevision programming subsidiary now known as AMC Networks Inc. Mr. Dolan began his career with Cablevision in the 1970s and held a variety of executive positions before overseeing Rainbow Media.

Mr. Dolan serves on the board of directors for MSG, MSG Networks Inc., and AMC Networks Inc. He is also on the board of The Lustgarten Foundation, an organization he helped found in 1998, which today is the nation's largest private supporter of pancreatic cancer research. Since its inception, the Foundation has directed more than \$125 million to research and assembled the best scientific minds with the hope that one day, a cure can be found.

David O'Connor is President and Chief Executive Officer of The Madison Square Garden Company (MSG), which includes renowned performance venues, entertainment properties, and professional sports teams. Mr. O'Connor is responsible for the Company's overall strategic vision, and for leading the Company's efforts to identify new initiatives that enhance MSG's existing brands and represent new opportunities for growth, including the formation of new strategic alliances and transactions.

The Company's signature assets consist of some of the nation's most dynamic and powerful sports and entertainment brands. This diverse collection of properties includes a portfolio of iconic venues: New York's Madison Square Garden, The Theater at Madison Square Garden, Radio City Music Hall and Beacon Theatre; the Forum in Inglewood, California; The Chicago Theatre; and the Wang Theatre in Boston. In addition, MSG owns and operates professional sports teams, the New York Knicks, Rangers and Liberty; and entertainment properties, including the Christmas Spectacular and New York Spectacular, both starring the Radio City Rockettes; and is part of strategic partnerships, including Azoff MSG Entertainment and Tribeca Enterprises.

Mr. O'Connor joined the Company in June 2015 and, as one of his first tasks, helped drive the successful spin-off of MSG from its predecessor company, now known as MSG Networks Inc. With the completion of this transaction, Mr. O'Connor laid out a plan to grow the new standalone sports and entertainment company. In addition to implementing an organizational structure that has readied the company for future growth, Mr. O'Connor has played a critical role in two new endeavors with a focus on expanding MSG's live experience offerings. These include the Company's plans to build a groundbreaking music and entertainment-focused venue to Las Vegas, and its investment in Boston Calling Events, which produces outdoor festivals, including New England's premier Boston Calling Music Festival.

Prior to joining MSG, Mr. O'Connor spent more than 30 years at CAA, where he served as Managing Partner of the world-wide entertainment and sports agency his last 20 years. He began his career at CAA in 1983 in the mailroom and was soon promoted to agent in the Motion Picture department. In 1995, Mr. O'Connor took over day-to-day management and ownership of the agency along with his partners, helping to expand the agency's operations and services around the globe, while maintaining the company's reputation as a trusted agency. In 1996, Mr. O'Connor and his partners broke new ground in the entertainment industry with the creation of the CAA Foundation, which involves the entertainment community and CAA clients in philanthropy and engages organizations to lend their support to a variety of philanthropic programs. This was followed in 2006 by the launch of CAA Sports, which today represents more than 1,000 of the world's top athletes, coaches and broadcasters, along with many of the biggest brands and properties in sports worldwide, including The Madison Square Garden Company.

In 2008, Mr. O'Connor also co-founded and established Evolution Media Capital (EMC), a CAA affiliate that provides investment banking and advisory, asset management, industry research, and capital-raising services to the media and sports industries, as well as Evolution Media Partners, a \$1 billion principal investing fund. And in 2012, Mr. O'Connor was instrumental in the creation of CAA Eleven, a dedicated CAA subsidiary that manages the media, sponsorship, and licensing rights for all National Team Football in Europe governed by UEFA (Union of European Football Associations).

Mr. O'Connor serves on the board of the Garden of Dreams Foundation, a non-profit organization that works closely with all areas of MSG to make dreams come true for children facing obstacles. Since its inception in 2006, the Foundation's relationship with MSG has enabled it to brighten the lives of more than 300,000 children and their families through one-in-a-lifetime experiences, college scholarships and larger community projects that make a real and lasting difference in children's lives. He also co-founded and serves as Chairman of City Lacrosse, an organization that teaches lacrosse and leadership skills to at-risk kids in South L.A.

Mr. O'Connor is married to Lona Williams and has two children, Lucy and Angus.



ISIAH THOMAS

TEAM PRESIDENT & ALTERNATE GOVERNOR NEW YORK LIBERTY

Isiah Thomas' professional career spans more than three decades in business and sports. He has garnered worldwide attention for his contributions on all levels of professional basketball, including induction into the NBA Hall of Fame, and for his successful business initiatives and philanthropic endeavors.

Thomas was named the President & Alternate Governor of the New York Liberty in May 2015, and since that time the Liberty has enjoyed two of the most successful seasons in franchise history.

In 2015, New York posted a franchise-best 23-11 regular season record, finished with the best record in the WNBA for the first time in franchise history, and was the top seed in the Eastern Conference for the first time since 2002. A year later, the Liberty again surpassed 20 wins, going 21-13 to finish 1st in the Eastern Conference and secure a 2nd-straight WNBA Playoff berth.

In 2016, the Liberty vaulted to 2nd amongst WNBA franchises in total attendance, and over the past two seasons, New York has been the league leader in partnership revenue and sponsorship revenue.

Thomas' vision with the Liberty is led by his focus on Community, Chemistry, Defense and Making Memories on and off the court.

"When building this team, there are four specific goals in mind," says Thomas. "We want our team to have great chemistry, identify players that would have a positive impact in the community, to be known for our on court defense first and making memories that will last forever."

The Liberty has bolstered its position as a franchise that fights for social equality, as its players have utilized their platforms to speak out against injustices through support of the Black Live Matter movement, LGBT rights, and gender equity.

Thomas' leadership and sharp business acumen continue to serve him well in his post-playing days. Following his retirement from the NBA, Thomas took a front office position as part owner and Executive Vice President of the Toronto Raptors expansion team. He also served as head coach of the Indiana Pacers; President, General Manager and Coach of the New York Knicks; and was owner of the Continental Basketball Association.

As Chairman and CEO of Isiah International LLC, an investment holdings company, Thomas is also the owner of several companies which include: Isiah Real Estate, a development firm specializing in commercial properties; TAND Properties, a property management firm, private equity and asset management firm; Isiah Marketing, Advertising and Public Relations; Thomas Imports, the exclusive importer of Cheurlin Champagnes and GRE3N Waste Removal. Thomas also co-owns the waste removal's sister company, RE3 Recycling, with his daughter, Lauren.

His other business investments include Popcorn Indiana (Co-Founder), and Sweetgreen.

As a player, Thomas built a reputation as a tireless worker and formidable competitor. The competitor-turned coach and manager was noted for his keen eye for discovering new talent. Thomas' leadership and fighting spirit helped guide the last-place Detroit Pistons to back-to-back championships in 1988 and 1989. While a Detroit Piston, Thomas was a player representative for the National Basketball Players Association and went on to serve as Vice President. In 1988, the NBA players elected Thomas to serve as President of the NBPA, where he served through 1994. During his NBPA tenure from 1983-1994, he helped establish four historic Collective Bargaining Agreements and pushed to raise the average NBA player's salary. He also used his keen knowledge of marketing to help build the expansion of professional basketball into a multi-billion dollar industry.

Thomas combined commitment, intelligence, and his athletic ability fortified him to become an NBA All-Star and Champion. Off the court, he dedicates a large portion of his time to working with youth programs in urban communities, helping to instill confidence, teamwork and leadership skills in young people. Inspired by his mother's work to improve the lives of disadvantaged women and families in Chicago, Thomas founded the Mary's Court Foundation in her honor to support the health, safety, academic and personal achievement of Chicago's youth and youth around the country. Thomas' service to educational, anti-crime and anti-poverty programs began in Detroit when he was in the NBA and continues today in many more cities across the United States.

Thomas gained national recognition for his role in Chicago's Peace Tournaments and his advocacy to prevent youth violence. With Father Michael Pfleger, Thomas launched the Peace Tournaments to reduce gang violence through communication and athletics. In early 2013, Thomas in partnership with Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel started a fundraising campaign to launch the Windy City Hoops program in ten park districts, offering a safe haven to kids and families through sports, and now he serves on the Chicago Public Safety Action Committee. He has also awarded more than 100 scholarships to criminal justice students through The Isiah Thomas Scholarship at Indiana University and has recently announced a new annual scholarship at the University of California at Berkeley in the African American Studies department.

Thomas credits his mother with instilling in him the importance of education. He finished his college degree at Indiana University during the Pistons' off-seasons and received his Master's in Education from University of California at Berkeley in 2013.

Bill Laimbeer, a two-time WNBA Coach of the Year and three-time WNBA Champion, enters his fifth season as head coach of the New York Liberty.

In 2016, Laimbeer guided the Liberty to a 2nd-straight 20-win season, just the 2nd time in franchise history the Liberty reached the 20-win plateau in consecutive years. Continuing to display the staples of Laimbeer's system, New York posted the best opponent field goal percentage in the WNBA (.413) and led the league in rebounding (38.6). Tina Charles earned 1st Team All-WNBA honors for a 2nd-straight season, and finished runner-up in the MVP balloting after becoming just the 3rd player in league history to win both the scoring and rebounding titles in the same season.

New York posted the best record in the Eastern Conference, but entering a new WNBA Playoff format, secured the No. 3 overall seed, and a bye into the 2nd round of the playoffs. However, the Liberty was eliminated in a winner-take-all game by the Phoenix Mercury, a step away from the league semifinals.

During the 2015 campaign, Laimbeer helped guide the franchise to the best regular season in team history, posting a franchise-record 23 victories while the Liberty was able to grab the top overall seed in the WNBA for the first time ever and the top spot in the Eastern Conference for the first time since 2002. New York advanced to the Eastern Conference Finals for its deepest playoff run since 2010.

Additionally, New York boasted a pair of All-WNBA performers for the first-time in Charles (First Team) and Epiphanny Prince (Second Team) while also seeing a pair of rookies, Kiah Stokes and Brittany Boyd, land on the WNBA All-Rookie Team. The Liberty led the league in points allowed per game (71.1) and defensive field goal percentage (.393).

Laimbeer previously spent eight seasons from 2002-09 as general manager and head coach of the Detroit Shock (now Tulsa Shock), where he earned WNBA Coach of the Year honors in his first full season as head coach (2003). He took over a team that finished 9-23 in the previous year and led them to a league-best 25 wins the following season. The 16-win improvement was the largest in WNBA history. Laimbeer led the Shock to a 137-93 (.596) overall record, including six-straight playoff appearances as the squad won the WNBA Championship in 2003, 2006 and 2008.

As general manager of the Shock, Laimbeer made several key moves during his tenure that were integral in Detroit capturing three WNBA Championships, which still stand as second most in league history. In his first full season, Laimbeer drafted former All-Star and 2003 Rookie of the Year Cheryl Ford. He also acquired the Finals MVP that year Ruth Riley in the WNBA dispersal draft.

Prior to returning to the WNBA, Laimbeer spent two seasons as an assistant in the NBA with the Minnesota Timberwolves (2009-2011).

A 14-year NBA veteran, Laimbeer was a four-time All-Star for the Detroit Pistons. As a member of the famed "Bad Boys," Laimbeer totaled 13,790 points and 10,400 rebounds in his career, becoming just the 19th player in NBA history to eclipse 10,000 in both categories. A key member of back-to-back NBA Championships in 1989 and 1990, he had his jersey No. 40 retired by the franchise in 1995. Laimbeer played college ball at Notre Dame from 1975-79, graduating with a degree in economics in 1979.

Laimbeer and his wife Chris are parents to their son Eric and daughter Keri.

KATIE SMITH

Associate Head Coach Coach - Fourth Season

New York Liberty

CAREER/COACHING HIGHLIGHTS

Katie Smith enters her fourth season as a member of the New York Liberty coaching staff, having been promoted to associate head coach for the 2016 season, after serving two years as an assistant coach. Since Smith joined the coaching staff, the Liberty has posted an overall record of 59-43 (.578), posting back-to-back 20-win seasons and WNBA Playoffs berths in 2015 and 2016.

Smith spent the 2013 season – her final in the WNBA – with the Liberty, reuniting with Bill Laimbeer who she won two titles with as a member of the Detroit Shock (now Dallas). She retired after the 2013 campaign, finishing her 17-year playing career as the all-time leading scorer in women's professional basketball and second in WNBA history, scoring 7,885-career points as a professional and 6,452 in the WNBA.

A 15-year veteran of the WNBA, Smith was a seven-time All-Star and two-time First Team All-WNBA selection. She won WNBA Championships in 2006 and 2008 with the Shock, and in 2011 was voted one of the Top 15 Players in WNBA history. She ranks first in the WNBA in both three-point field goals made (906) and attempted (2,466), second in career points (6,452), fourth in free throws made (1,440) and 10th in all-time assists (1,258).

Smith is the all-time leading scorer in the history of U.S. women's professional basketball (ABL & WNBA) with 7,885 career points. Smith signed with the WNBA in 1999, joining Minnesota after a two-year stint in the ABL. In 2006, she became the only player to win a championship with both the ABL and WNBA, which was the same year she became the first player to win a WNBA All-Star game as a member of both the Eastern and Western Conference teams. During the WNBA's 20th season in 2016, Smith was voted as one of the top-20 best and most influential players in league history.

Her success also extended to the international level, having won three Olympic Gold Medals in 2000, 2004 and 2008, and the World Championships in 1998 and 2002.

Smith spent several seasons on the women's basketball staff at her alma mater Ohio State University. As a student-athlete for the Buckeyes, Smith helped guide her team to the NCAA championship game as a freshman, and went on to break the Big Ten scoring record for points scored in a career in men's or women's basketball. On Jan. 21, 2001, Ohio State honored her as the first female Buckeye athlete to have her number retired.

HERB WILLIAMS

Assistant Coach - Third Season

New York Liberty

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Spent 18 seasons in the NBA, playing with the Indiana Pacers, Dallas Mavericks, Toronto Raptors and New York Knicks.

Herb Williams begins his third season with the New York Liberty after joining Bill Laimbeer's staff prior to the 2015 season. He returned to Madison Square Garden after spending 13 seasons as a coach for the New York Knicks (2001-2014), which marked the longest tenure of any on-the-bench assistant coach in franchise history.

Over the past two seasons as Williams has worked primarily with the Liberty's front court players, New York has posted the best defensive field goal percentage in the league, and led the WNBA in rebounding (38.6) during the 2016 season. All-Star forward Tina Charles has earned back-to-back All-WNBA First-Team nods, and was the runner-up for league MVP in 2016, when she became just the 3rd player in WNBA history to lead the league in scoring and rebounding in the same season.

Included in Williams' coaching tenure is an overall mark of 17-27 as Knicks head coach. Succeeding Lenny Wilkens as Knicks headmaster on Jan. 22, 2005, Herb piloted New York for the remainder of the 2004-05 season, going 16-27. He also notched a 120-110 win over Orlando as interim coach on Jan. 14, 2004, prior to Wilkens' formal arrival. Herb has also served as head coach of the Knicks' entries in the 2003 Reebok Boston Summer Pro League and the 2004 LA Summer Pro League in Long Beach.

During his playing tenure, Williams was a force in New York's locker room as a leader both on and off the court. For three seasons (1996-97 through 1998-99), he served as Knicks tri-captain. His knowledge and leadership qualities made him a natural for his post-playing career.

As a Knick, Herb became a Garden fan favorite as Hall of Famer Patrick Ewing's primary backup in the pivot as well as a guiding force off the court. His final on-court appearance — a scoreless minute in Game Five of The 1999 NBA Finals against San Antonio — made him the oldest Knick ever to appear in a game (41 years, four months, nine days).

Williams' longtime identification with the Knicks and the world's greatest basketball city was formally cited on Feb. 20, 2012, when he received the fourth annual "Dick McGuire Knicks Legacy Award," given annually to an individual whose contributions both on and off the court mirror those of the late, beloved Hall of Famer.

Williams' coaching tenure follows a distinguished playing career that spanned 18 seasons (1981-82 through 1998-99), just three shy of the all-time NBA record of 21 shared by Robert Parish and Kevin Willis. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Herb is one of only nine players in NBA history to appear in a game following his 41st birthday, along with Parish, Willis, Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, Bob Cousy, Nat Hickey, Charles Jones, John Stockton and Dikembe Mutombo.

Indiana's first-round pick (14th overall) in the 1981 NBA Draft, the 6-foot-11 Williams averaged 10.8 points, 5.9 rebounds and shot .467 from the field for the Pacers, Mavericks, Raptors and Knicks. He scored 11,944 points in 1,102 career games. Herb played the first 7½ seasons of his career with Indiana, and is third in blocked shots (1,094; behind only Jermaine O'Neal and Rik Smits), seventh in games played (577), seventh in total minutes (18,455) and eighth in total rebounds (4,494) on the Pacers' all-time franchise lists. Williams spent virtually all of the final seven years of his playing career as a Knick, and was one of only two players (along with Ewing) to be a member of both of the Knicks' Eastern Conference Championship teams of 1994 and 1999. He originally signed with the Knicks as a free agent on Nov. 15, 1992. Williams was part of two separate trades (to Toronto on Feb. 18, 1996 and to Philadelphia on Feb. 19, 1998), but quickly returned to the Big Apple just days after both.

- Won an Olympic Gold Medal in the 1988 Olympic Games in Seoul, South Korea, and a Bronze Medal in 1992 in Barcelona, Spain
- Spent six seasons as the head women's basketball coach at her alma mater Louisiana Tech, leading the Lady Techsters to back-to-back NCAA Tournament berths (2010, 2011).
- Coached the Westchester Phantoms of the ABA in 2007
- In 2011, was voted as one of the Top-15 players in WNBA history
- In 2016, was voted as one of the Top-20 best and most influential players in WNBA history

A Liberty legend, Teresa Weatherspoon joined the New York Liberty in the WNBA's inaugural season in 1997 after being selected 10th overall in the inaugural WNBA Elite Draft. A four-time All-Star, she helped guide New York to four WNBA Finals appearances (1997, 1999, 2000, 2002) and was inducted into the Liberty Ring of Honor in 2011.

Weatherspoon was a four-time All-WNBA Second Team selection and two-time Defensive Player of the Year (1997, 1998) during her eight-year career, averaging 5.0 points, 3.1 rebounds and 5.3 assists per game.

She is the Liberty's all-time leader in assists (1,306) and steals (453), and ranks ninth in WNBA history in assists and 19th in steals.

Following seven seasons with the Liberty, Weatherspoon signed with the Los Angeles Sparks in 2004, retiring at the end of the season.

Named one of the Top-20 best and most influential players in WNBA history in 2016, she was also the first player in the league to post 1,000 points and 1,000 assists for her career. Orchestrating what may be the most remarkable play in WNBA history, Weatherspoon hit a shot from midcourt as time expired in game two of the 1999 WNBA Finals against the Houston Comets, staving off elimination for the Liberty and forcing a decisive third game to decide the championship.

A 2010 inductee into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame, Weatherspoon enjoyed an equally decorated collegiate career, leading the Louisiana Tech Lady Techsters to a National Championship in 1988. A two-time All-American, she won the Wade Trophy (National Player of the Year) and was a Gold medalist at the 1988 Olympics in Seoul, South Korea, and won a Bronze medal at the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona, Spain.

Weatherspoon began her coaching career as the head coach of the Westchester Phantoms of the American Basketball Association in 2007. In 2008, she joined the coaching staff of Louisiana Tech, where she was the head coach from 2008-2014, leading her alma mater to three postseason berths, including back-to-back Western Athletic Conference titles and NCAA Tournament berths in 2010 and 2011.

After serving as a consultant with the New York Liberty during the 2014 WNBA season, she joined the coaching staff as the first Director of Player Development in franchise history for 2015. In 2016, she was named also named the Director of the Liberty Basketball Academy. As the Director of Player Development, Weatherspoon focuses on court instruction, individual workouts with Liberty players, and scouting opponents. Her work with the Liberty Basketball Academy results in the oversight of all youth instructional programs and camps. Prior to the start of the 2017 season, she was named Director of Franchise Development, undertaking a larger role in the Liberty's front office, contributing to off court and team business initiatives.

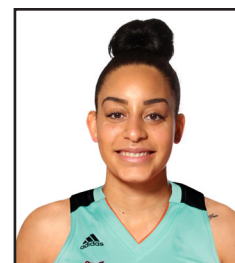
