WESTERN CONFERENCE SEMIFINALS SERIES NOTES:

- Los Angeles and Minnesota will go against each other in the WNBA Playoffs for the third time in the two teams' history (2003, 2012)
- Los Angeles and Minnesota will meet for the second time in franchise history in the WNBA Western Conference Semifinals, and third time in WNBA Playoffs history (2003, 2012). The first meeting between both Los Angeles and Minnesota was in 2003 when Los Angeles (#1) defeated Minnesota (#4), 2-1 in the Western Conference Semifinals. The Sparks lost game one at Minnesota, but came away with the last two at home
- The last time the Sparks faced the Lynx in the postseason was in the 2012 WNBA Western Conference Finals, with Los Angeles falling to Minnesota 2-0. Forward Candace Parker averaged a playoff series-high 29.0 points and 13.0 rebounds against Minnesota through two games played. Parker set a playoff career-high 33 points on October 7, 2012 against Minnesota
- The Sparks forced the Lynx to 24 turnovers (2nd most in WNBA Playoff history) and stole the ball 15 times (3rd most in WNBA Playoff history) on August 30, 2003 in the WNBA Western Conference Semifinals. Game 3
- Los Angeles recorded a 58.1 offensive rebound percentage (2nd highest in WNBA Playoff history) versus Minnesota on October 7, 2012 (WNBA Western Conference Finals, Game 2)

SPARK PLUGS

IT ALL STARTS HERE

Los Angeles will make its 15th franchise playoff appearance on September 18, most by any team in WNBA history. The road to the WNBA Championship begins in the Western Conference Semifinals, where the Sparks own a 7-7 record on its opening playoff games. When the Sparks win game one of the Western Conference Semifinals, they have gone on to advance to the next round every time. There has only been two instances in which the Sparks lost game one of the Western Conference Semifinals and still advanced into the Western Conference Finals - 2003, 2006. The last time the Sparks won game one of the Western Conference Semifinals was in 2012, where they went on to the next round.

ON THE (PLAYOFF) ROAD, AGAIN

This will be the ninth time the Sparks will begin the Western Conference Semifinals on the road. Los Angeles is 3-5 all-time when playing it's first playoff game on the road. In five of those eight (game one) games - win or lose, the Sparks managed to advance to the Western Conference Finals.

THREE ROUNDS, ONE WINNER

All-time, the Sparks are 8-5 in the best-of-three Western Conference Semifinals series - excluding the 1999 WNBA Playoffs (first round, single-game elimination). When Los Angeles reached the second round, they went 3-6 in the Western Conference Finals series. In those three trips to the championship round, the Sparks are 2-1 overall having won back-to-back WNBA titles in 2001 and 2002. Los Angeles is one of only three current teams to have won at least two WNBA Championships in franchise history - excludes former Detroit Shock (3 WNBA titles)/current Tulsa Shock.

NOT THEIR FIRST RODEO

Sparks players Farhiya Abdi, Alana Beard, Jantel Lavender, Nneka Ogwumike, Candace Parker and Kristi Toliver are the only returning players from the 2014 Sparks playoff roster. However, the new components to the team this year includes postseason experience from Temeka Johnson (six playoff appearances, 33 games), Erin Phillips (two-time WNBA Champion, 36 games) and Michelle Snow (seven playoff appearances, 20 games) - both Johnson and Phillips have reached the WNBA Finals in their career while Snow has reached the Western Conference Finals once.

LEAVING A LEGACY

Already known as the most winningest coach in women's professional basketball, 12-year WNBA head coach Brian Agler is on his way to becoming the first head coach in league history to win the WNBA Championship with two different teams - current New York Liberty head coach and former Detroit Shock head coach, Bill Laimbeer has the same opportunity. In terms of playoff coaching, Agler owns the seventh best playoff winning percentage (min. 10 postseason wins) in WNBA history with a win percentage of .524. He is also one of only three other current coaches in the postseason to have a playoffs winning percentage above .500 (min. 10 postseason wins).

BEST ROOKIE OUT THERE

Among rookie league leaders, guard Ana Dabovic is the only rookie heading into the postseason to be ranked in the top five - per game - in scoring (2nd), assists (T-5th), field goal percentage (5th), three-point field goal percentage (3rd), free-throw percentage (4th), steals (2nd) and minutes played (3rd). Only rookie close to Dabovic's feat is New York Liberty rookie guard Kiah Stokes as she ranks top five in four categories compared to Dabovic's seven.

QUITE THE ACCURACY

Since 2011, the Sparks are one of only two teams (the other being the Lynx) to be ranked among the top five teams in field goal percentage at the end of each season. This year, Los Angeles recorded a league-best 45.2 percent field goal percentage. The last time the Sparks sat atop the league leaderboard was in 2013, when the team shot 47.5 percent from the field.

MRS. PLAYOFF BASKETBALL

Since her arrival to the league in 2008, forward Candace Parker has been to the WNBA playoffs six times in her career. In each of those six post-season appearances, Parker has ranked in the top 10 in scoring among postseason players. She had led all scorers in the playoffs in consecutive seasons (2012, 2013). Parker's single postseason career-best was in 2012 when she averaged 28.8 points through four games. In addition to her postseason scoring performances, Parker averaged a double-double in 2012 and 2009 - Parker and Sparks legend Lisa Leslie are the only Sparks players to have averaged double-double numbers at least twice in their postseason career.

UN-SUNG HERO

Forward Jantel Lavender is the only player on the Sparks roster to have started and played in all 34 games - first time in her career to start in every game played. She also led the led the with most 10+ point games (30) and 10+ rebound games (12) and has led the team in scoring (14), rebounding (16), blocked shots (14) and minutes played (11) in a game. Considered the team's Iron Woman, Lavender has played 139 consecutive regular season games - second most in franchise history.

DOUBLE DARE YOU

Through 34 games, Los Angeles led the league in total double-doubles recorded with 32 (Lavender - 12, Parker - 12, Ogwumike - 6, Johnson - 2). In addition, forwards Jantel Lavender and Candace Parker dominated the WNBA's double-double scene, as both were the only players in the league with at least 10 double-doubles. Lavender and Parker led the league with the most double-doubles (12). Through her 16 games played, Parker was the only player in the WNBA to have averaged double-double numbers (19.4 ppg, 10.1 rpg). In addition, Parker was

SPARK PLUGS

NOT ON FULL THROTTLE

The Sparks will head into the postseason missing one player, a situation familiar to the team all year. Through 34 regular season contests, Los Angeles has not had all 12 players suited up come game-time. For the first round of playoff action, it'll be a similar scene. While picking up center Michelle Snow, with the end of season injury suffered by Marianna Tolo, guard Erin Phillips will be out with a knee injury for the remainder of the Sparks season - leaving Los Angeles with 11 active players. There had been at least one player listed as injured throughout the entire season while guards Ana Dabovic (10 missed games) and Kristi Toliver (6 missed games) were out due to national team commitments. Forward Candace Parker also missed a portion of the season (16 games) to rest from year-round basketball play. In total, five players (Abdi, Beard, Ogwumike, Phillips, Tolo) made up a total of 64 missed games this season for the Sparks – almost double the number of games the team has played to date. The most the Sparks have had available for a game has been 11 players, and that was on August 6 vs. Tulsa. Guard Erin Phillips was out with a knee injury. The least amount of Sparks players dressed and available for game-time was 8, on four separate occasions early on in the season (6/16 vs Minnesota, 6/21 vs Connecticut, 6/26 at Connecticut, 6/28 at New York).

ALWAYS TRYING SOMETHING NEW

In 34 games played, the Sparks have seen 18 different starting five combinations this season. At the beginning of the year, Los Angeles's first seven consecutive games consisted of a new player and/or role. Last season the Sparks utilized only nine different lineups, however with less injuries and less absent players throughout the year. This season, the most winning starting five (5-2 record, .714) the Sparks saw included guards Kristi Toliver and Alana Beard with forwards Nneka Ogwumike, Candace Parker and Jantel Lavender occupying the front court.

TWO IS BETTER THAN ONE

There were six games in which two Sparks players each recorded a double-double in the same game, most instances of duo double-double performances in the WNBA this season

WESTERN CONFERENCE PLAYER OF THE WEEK (TWELVE)

On September 8, 2015, the WNBA named Sparks forward Candace Parker the WNBA Western Conference Player of the Week for games played from August 31 through September 6. Parker led Los Angeles to a 2-0 record while pacing the league in scoring (29.5 ppg). She also tied for third among Western Conference players in rebounding (9.5 rpg) and assists (5.5 apg), and was seventh in field goal percentage (.636, 21-of-33) and three-point shooting (.545, 6-of-11). Parker began the week with her 12th double-double in 15 games, recording game highs of 26 points and 11 rebounds to go with six assists in a 93-91 home win over the Washington Mystics on Sept. 3. Three days later, she again led all scorers, with 33 points, and added eight rebounds and five assists as the Sparks defeated the visiting Tulsa Shock 92-73 to clinch a playoff berth. This is Parker's second player of the week nod in three weeks. Congratulations Candace Parker!

WESTERN CONFERENCE PLAYER OF THE MONTH

On September 3, the WNBA named forward Candace Parker Western Conference Player of the Month for games played in August. This is Parker's first of the season, fifth of her career. In the month of August, she averaged a double-double of 17.3 points and 10.5 rebounds - only player in the month of August to average a double-double - on top of 6.3 assists, 2.3 steals and 2.0 blocked shots through 12 games played. Her all-around play led the Sparks to an 8-4 record in August, top among western conference teams. Since rejoining the team on July 29, she has helped Los Angeles to a 9-5 record post WNBA All-Star break. Congratulations Candace Parker!

CHARITABLE NNEKA

On September 3, forward Nneka Ogwumike set a career-high 14 freethrows made. Her 14 points at the charity stripe tied for second-most in franchise history for free-throws made in a game. This season, Ogwumike is shooting 87 percent (82-95 FT) from the free throw line. Overall, Ogwumike leads the team in free-throws made and attempted.

IT'S HOW YOU FINISH

Los Angeles rallied back from a 15-point deficit and won on September 3 against Washington. It was the fifth time this season the Sparks were overcame a deficit of 10 points or more. All five games were decided by five points or less with Los Angeles coming away victorious. Close games they were, as the Sparks won by a ± 2.8 -point differential in games when down by 10 points or more and rally back to win.

FOR THE WIN!

Rookie guard Ana Dabovic made the game-winning shot with 6.1 seconds left in the fourth quarter to propel Los Angeles to a 81-79 victory over Indiana on August 26. The win extended the Sparks win streak to three straight while it snapped the Fever's six-game win streak. Dabovic's step-back jumper was the only game-winner recorded for the Sparks this season.

SPARK PLUGS

WESTERN CONFERENCE PLAYER OF THE WEEK (TEN)

On August 24, 2015, the WNBA named Sparks forward Candace Parker the WNBA Western Conference Player of the Week for games played through August 17 through August 23. This is Parker's first one of the year and 14th career Western Conference Player of the Week award in her eight WNBA seasons. For the week, Parker led the league in scoring (23.7 ppg), rebounding (10.7 rpg), and steals (3.3 spg). She also shared the WNBA lead in assists (6.0 apg, along with Chicago's Courtney Vandersloot) and ranked sixth among Western Conference players in field goal percentage (.509, 28-of-55). Parker began the week with game-highs of 25 points, eight steals, six assists and three blocks, as well as 10 rebounds in a 79-68 home loss in the first meeting against the Indiana Fever this season on Aug. 18. Three days later she led all scorers with 26 points in a 78-68 victory over the Phoenix Mercury in which she also contributed 10 boards, three assists, two steals and a block. Parker closed out the week with a near triple-double in a 90-59 road win over the San Antonio Stars on Aug. 23, as she logged 20 points, 12 rebounds, and nine assists. In all three contests, Parker recorded a double-double.

SPARKS NATION

On August 30, the Los Angeles Sparks set a new franchise record of 19,076 announced attendance - three seats shy of a sellout capacity crowd. It broke the previous record of 18,997 fans by 79 tickets. The now second-most attendance was set on July 21, 2004 against the Washington Mystics also at STAPLES Center. To date, the Sparks have yet had a capacity sellout game held at the Forum (former arena) or STAPLES Center in franchise history.

GET THAT OUTTA HERE

Los Angeles played shutdown defense on August 23 in a 90-59 win over San Antonio. In the game, the Sparks recorded 14 blocked shots - second most in a game in franchise history. The 14 blocked shots was also a league-best this season for most blocked shots in a game.

30-FOR-30

Los Angeles built up a 37-point lead in the second half at San Antonio on August 23 to and finish the game with a 31-point victory. The 37-point lead is the largest lead the Sparks have held this season. The 31-point difference, in favor of the Sparks, also set a new season-high for the largest margin of victory for the Sparks in 2015. It was the first 30-point win this season, and only seventh win in Sparks history by a margin of 30 points or more.

HANDS IN THE COOKIE JAR

Forward Candace Parker dominated on the defensive end against Indiana on August 18, as she set a new franchise record eight steals. The pre-vious Sparks player to hold the record (7) was Armintie Herrington, set at Washington on June 1, 2014. Parker's eight steals are the most in a game by any WNBA player this season. She was two shy of tying the WNBA record (10) held by former Sacramento guard Ticha Penicheiro against San Antonio on July 10, 2003.

A STAT SHEET STUFFER

On Tuesday versus Indiana (August 18), forward Candace Parker finished the game with 25 points, 10 rebounds, six assists and eight steals. The last WNBA player to record at least 25 points, 10 rebounds, five assists and five steals in a game was also Parker, on June 1, 2014 (32 points, 12 rebounds, six assists, six steals). Other than herself, only one other WNBA player has tallied at least 25-10-5-5 in a game, former Phoenix forward Brandy Reed (32 points, 13 rebounds, six assists, seven steals) on June 22, 2000. To put Parker's performance into greater perspective, the last time a NBA player recorded at least 25 points, 10 rebounds, six assists and eight steals in a game was Toronto Raptor's Doug Christie (29 points, 15 rebounds, seven assists, eight steals) on April 2, 1997 - 18 years ago.

DUB NATION

In the home wins over Minnesota on August 4 and Tulsa on August 6, Los Angeles defeated the two teams by 20 points or more, respectively. In both occasions, Los angeles set marks for its largest margin of victories - +22 vs Minnesota, +27 vs Tulsa. The Sparks are one of three teams this season (Chicago, Indiana) to have won back-to-back games by a margin of 20 or more. In franchise history, Los Angeles has won back-to-back games by 20 points or more six times, most recently on June 15, 2013 vs San Antonio (84-48) and June 21, 2013 vs Minnesota (87-59).

PAINTING THE TOWN PURPLE AND GOLD

In addition to the 20+ point back-to-back home wins, Los Angeles scored a total of 104 points in the paint in the two home games played (50 points vs Minnesota, 8/4; 54 points vs Tulsa, 8/6). Los Angeles outscored its opponents in the paint on both occasions coming away with a victory. The last time a team scored at least fifty points in the paint in back-to-back games and won them both, each by a margin of at least 20 points, was in the WNBA's first season, when the Sparks did it twice - (June 25, 1997 vs Charlotte; June 27, 1997 vs Sacramento) and (July 27, 1997 at Sacramento; July 30, 1997 vs Utah).

WESTERN CONFERENCE PLAYER OF THE WEEK (FOUR)

On July 6, 2015, the WNBA named Sparks forward Nneka Ogwumike the WNBA Western Conference Player of the Week for games played June 29 through July 5. This is Ogwumike's fourth career Western Conference Player of the Week award in her four WNBA seasons. For the week, she ranked second in the Western Conference in scoring (24.0 ppg), while pacing the West in rebounding (12.3 rpg) and tying for second in steals (1.67 spg). Ogwumike opened the week with 27 points, eight rebounds, two assists, and two steals in an 86-81 win over San Antonio (7/2). She then contributed consecutive double-doubles with 19 points, 10 rebounds, and two steals in a 98-95 win over Tulsa (7/3), 26 points, a season-high 19 rebounds, one steal and one blocked shot in an overtime loss against Phoenix (7/5).

TOLIVER'S HISTORIC NIGHT

Sparks guard Kristi Toliver gave Sparks fans a night to rememver on July 3, as Toliver set the franchise record for most points scored in a game with 43 - surpassing Sparks legend Lisa Leslie's 41 points set against San Antonio on June 25, 2006. By scoring 40-plus points, Toliver became only the third player in team history to record 40 points or more in a game. As she accomplished a franchise record, Toliver also reached a career feat of 2300 total points during the game. Toliver's 43 had bested her previous career-high of 30 points, which was set earlier in the season at New York on June 28. This is Toliver's second career 30-plus point performance, all done this season, ranking her third all-time in franchise history for most games with 30 points or more. Toliver's 43 was just the 19th time in WNBA history that a player scored 40 points or more in a game in the regular season. Toliver and Chicago Sky's Elena Delle Donne were the only players in the league this season to have recorded at least 40 points in a game.

EQUITRUST THE SPARKS

On May 21, the Sparks announced EquiTrust as the marquee sponsor for the 2015 season. Under the agreement, the EquiTrust logo will appear on all Sparks home and road jerseys, throughout STAPLES Center on Sparks home game days, on the step and repeat backdrop, across all social and digital platforms and as the driving force behind the new charitable leadership youth program, Driven2Hoop.

With its announcement, the Sparks are now the eighth team in the WNBA to have a marquee partnership.

Head Coach Brian Agler 1st Season

On January 5, 2015, Brian Agler joined the Los Angeles Sparks as the 12th head coach in franchise history, bringing with him over 30 years of head-coaching experience, including 11 in the WNBA.

Agler comes to the Sparks from Seattle, where he led the Storm to six consecutive playoff appearances (2008-2013) in seven years. He compiled a 136-102 (.571) record during his time in the Pacific Northwest, including his 212th career (WNBA and ABL) victory in 2012. The win on June 1 against the Tulsa Shock moved him past Van Chancellor (211), former coach of the Houston Comets, to become the all-time winningest coach in women's professional basketball history. Agler won

78 games in the ABL and now has 198 WNBA regular season wins (276 total).

In 2010 the Storm captured the league's championship title, its second, with an impressive regular season record of 28-6 and an undefeated playoff record of 7-0. Additionally, Coach Agler was recognized as the WNBA's Coach of the Year. Prior to joining the Storm in 2008, Agler was the head coach and general manager of the expansion team Minnesota Lynx from 1999-2002, where he compiled a 42-54 (.438) record. Before being named the first coach of the expansion Lynx, Agler served as the head coach of the Columbus Quest of the ABL from 1996-1999, compiling an 82-22 record. He led the Quest to back-to-back ABL championships in 1997 and 1998 and was named the ABL Coach of the Year for the 1996-97 season.

Agler completed his third season as an assistant coach for the San Antonio Silver Stars in 2007. Prior to joining San Antonio, he served as an assistant coach with the Phoenix Mercury in 2004 and helped guide the team to a 17-17 record after the Mercury finished with an 8-26 record in 2003.

Agler spent 15 seasons coaching among the collegiate ranks, including 13 seasons as a head coach. He posted an impressive collegiate record of 248-135 (.648 winning percentage). From 1993-96 he served as the head women's basketball coach at Kansas State. In 1998, Agler took over as the head women's coach at the University of Missouri-Kansas City. In five seasons at UMKC, Agler was 85-54 and took the Kangaroos from a 9-16 record in 1988-89 to four straight winning seasons with 17 or more victories. Under his direction, UMKC led the NCAA in scoring defense three consecutive season from 1990-93. In 1991, UMKC set an NCAA record, allowing 51.8 points per game.

As the head women's basketball coach at Northeast Oklahoma A&M Junior College from 1984-88, Agler compiled a 124-42 record (.747 winning percentage). In 1985-86, NEO A&M was ranked second nationally and posted a 30-2 record.

Agler attended Wittenberg University in Springfield, Ohio, where he starred on the basketball team for four seasons. He led the Tigers to their only NCAA Division III Championship in basketball as a freshman. He started all 112 games during his college career, leaving the school as the all-time assist leader (481). Agler helped lead his team to a 91-21 record during his four years with the Tigers, and was named most valuable player in the Ohio Athletic Conference and first-team All-America as a senior. In 1995, he was inducted into the Wittenberg Hall of Honor.

In 1980, Agler graduated with a degree in special education and physical education. He received his master's degree in education from Pittsburg State University (Pittsburg, Kansas) in 1985. Agler and his wife Robin, have one son, Bryce, and one daughter, Taylor.

Jantel Lavender recorded her eighth consecutive double-figure scoring performance and earned her fifth double-double of the season with 21 points and 10 rebounds. Guard Temeka Johnson reached 2500 total career points, surpassing the mark on a three-pointer in the fourth quarter to give her a total of 2502 career points.
