The 2018 All-Star finished last season sixth in the league in assists per game, tallying a career-high 11 dimes in the Sparks' 80-54 victory against the Liberty on June 24. Gray scored a career-high 26 points in the Sparks' 74-66 victory against New York Aug. 14. Gray also finished sixth in the league with 1.4 steals per game and led the Sparks in assists, averaging a career-high 5.1 per game.

The former Rookie of the Year and two-time All-Star appeared and started in all 31 games, averaging 14.4 points and 7.5 rebounds per game with the Connecticut Sun. Oguwmike averaged a career-high 60.3 field goal percentage in her first WNBA season after sitting out the 2017 seasons due to injury. Oguwmike registered a new career-high of 30 points in a loss to Seattle on June 30 and helped the Sun finish fourth in the league with a 21-13 record.

The former Rookie of the Year, two-time MVP and 2016 WNBA Finals MVP passed the 5,000 career points milestone during the Sparks' 78-75 win over the Phoenix Mercury on Aug. 5. Parker averaged a team-high 17.9 points per game and her 4.7 assists per game ranks eighth overall in the WNBA and first overall for non-point guards. In the Sparks' Aug. 8 victory against New York, she became the 12th player in WNBA history to reach the 2,500 rebound milestone.

The 2017 and 2018 Defensive Player of the Year scored 11 points, including five in overtime to help the Sparks beat the Storm 77-75 on July 10. Beard also scored 10 fourth-quarter points to lift the Sparks over the Mystics, winning 97-86 on June 15. Beard averaged 4.0 points, 3.3 rebounds and her 1.5 steals per game last season was good for fourth in the league last season.

Nneka Ogwumike led the Sparks in field goal percentage and steals per game last season. Ogwumike finished third in the WNBA in steals per game, averaging 1.6. She reached double-digit scoring in all but one of her 27 games in 2018. In the Sparks' victory over the Liberty on Aug. 8, she eclipsed 3,500 points for her career. Ogwumike scored in double-figures in 26 out of the 27 games and logged a season-high 25 points in a win over Indiana on May 22.

PRESEASON FINALE

The Los Angeles Sparks will host the Seattle Storm – the defending WNBA Champions – in their second preseason game. The teams will have an opportunity to bounce back after both teams fell to the Phoenix Mercury in each of their respective preseason openers earlier this week. The Storm will be without last season's MVP Breanna Stewart, who suffered a ruptured Achilles when playing overseas.

FISHER'S NET

The Los Angeles Sparks named Derek Fisher as its new head coach during the offseason on December 5, 2018. Fisher won five titles in 18 NBA seasons with the Los Angeles Lakers, and played alongside Kobe Bryant and Shaquille O'Neal en route to three consecutive titles from 2000 to 2002. Fisher began his coaching career as the head coach of the New York Knicks during the 2015-2016 season. The Sparks' 12th head coach hopes to translate his championship experience to the Sparks as he enters his first season in the league for the 2019 WNBA season.

NEW FACES

In addition to bringing in head coach Derek Fisher, the Los Angeles Sparks also made some roster changes as well. The Sparks took center Kalani Brown as the seventh overall pick and guard Marina Mabrey as the 19th overall pick in the 2019 WNBA Draft. Following the draft, Los Angeles acquired guard Alexis Jones from the Minnesota Lynx in exchange for guard Odyssey Sims, before trading a first-round pick to the Connecticut Sun in exchange for two-time All-Star forward/center Chiney Ogwumike. Before the draft, the Sparks signed free agent guard Tierra Ruffin-Pratt, who played six seasons with the Washington Mystics and helped them reach the 2018 WNBA Finals. The Sparks also added free agents forward Ashley Walker, center Rachel Hollivay, guard Cierra Dilliard to their preseason camp roster.

IT ALL STARTS UP FRONT

Already with a deep frontcourt in forwards Candace Parker, Nneka Ogwumike, Jantel Lavender and Maria Vadeeva last season, the Sparks will add forward/center Chiney Ogwumike and center Kalani Brown to the rotation. The four were pivotal to the Sparks posting the WNBA's fifth best field goal percentage of 45.2 during Los Angeles' 2018 year campaign. Ogwumike averaged 14.4 points and 7.5 rebounds per game in Connecticut, shooting a career-high 60.3 percent from the field. Brown — who helped Baylor win the 2019 NCAA Championship — averaged 15.6 points and 8.1 rebounds per game during her senior season.

AB'S D

Guard/forward Alana Beard earned WNBA's Defensive Player of the Year award for the second consecutive season after winning the award in 2018. Beard is just the second Sparks player to earn the award, joining Lisa Leslie (2004, 2008). Entering her 14th season in 2019, Beard started in the 30 regular-season games that she played, after starting 34 regular-season games in back-to-back seasons in 2017 and 2018. Beard was a catalyst of a Sparks defense that averaged a league-best 8.5 steals per game – the second straight season Los Angeles has lead the WNBA in steals.

GRAY SCALE

The Sparks announced the resigning of guard Chelsea Gray on April 30. Gray evolved into one of the best point guards in the league, averaging new career-highs in points (14.9), assists (5.1), rebounds (3.4) and steals (1.4) in her second season as a full time starter. In her fourth season in the league, Gray earned her second consecutive WNBA All-Star honors after having a breakout season in 2017. Gray opened last season with a game-winning buzzer-beater to give the Sparks a 77-76 win over the Minnesota Lynx.





SEATTLE STORM

PREVIEW: The Los Angeles Sparks will take on the Seattle Storm in their second preseason game before kicking off the WNBA regular season. The Sparks held onto a two-point halftime lead against the Phoenix Mercury in their first preseason contest on May 11, but ultimately fell to the Mercury 82-75.



Breanna Stewart, who is out for the season with a ruptured Achilles, and veteran guard Sue Bird, who sat out for rest.



The Storm led the league in field-goal percentage and 3-point percentage last season en route to their third WNBA Championship. Seattle edged Phoenix in a thrilling five-game series in the semifinals last year before sweeping the Washington Mystics to win the title.

During the offseason, the Storm drafted forward Anriel Howard in the second round and signed guards Receé Caldwell and Presley Hudson to their preseason roster. Although Seattle was without guard Alysha Clark, guard Jewell Loyd and guard Sami Whitcomb due to overseas commitments, the three rookies combined to score 22 points in the Storm's preseason game against the Mercury.

The Sparks went 1-2 against the Storm during the 2018 season, with the most recent game going into overtime when Candace Parker hit a turnaround jumper to ice the win for Los Angeles. After hosting the Storm, the Sparks will tip off their season on the road against the Las Vegas Aces on May 26.

DEREK FISHER BIOGRAPHY

HEAD COACH DEREK FISHER



Derek Fisher was named the 12th head coach of the Los Angeles Sparks on December 5, 2018. Fisher is a Los Angeles basketball legend, playing 18 seasons in the NBA and winning five championships with the Los Angeles Lakers. Fisher was drafted 24th overall by the Lakers in 1996, and played alongside Kobe Bryant and Shaquille O'neal en route to three consecutive titles from 2000-2002. He later added two more rings in 2009 and 2010 with Los Angeles. Fisher also played for the Golden State Warriors, Utah Jazz, Dallas Mavericks and Oklahoma City Thunder.

Fisher's accolades include holding the all-time NBA record for playoff game appearances (259). He's also known for hitting a buzzer-beater with 0.4 seconds left against the San Antonio Spurs in Game 5 of the 2004 Western Conference Semifinals as a member of the Lakers. In his time as a player, he served as president of the players' union from 2006-2013.

After finishing the 2013 season with the Thunder, Fisher transitioned to the sidelines, being named head coach of the New York Knicks on June 10, 2014. Fisher coached into the 2015-2016 season with New

York, helping develop then-rookie Kristaps Porzingis.

Fisher is a native of Little Rock, Arkansas where he attended Parkview Arts and Science Magnet High School, lettering in basketball. He then attended the University of Arkansas at Little Rock, where he finished his four-year career second all-time in school history in points (1,393), assists (472) and steals (189). His senior year, he was named Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year.

In the spring of 2016, Fisher became a television analyst for TNT, NBA TV and later Spectrum SportsNet as an in-studio analyst for the Lakers.
