## SERIES NOTES

- Seattle is facing Phoenix twice during its preseason for the fourth consecutive season.
- The Storm is 5-5 all-time against the Mercury in preseason games, including 4-1 at KeyArena.
- Phoenix has yet to win a road opener in Seattle, holding an 0-4 record, including its most recent defeat on June 2, 2013 (75-72).
- Seattle's 86 points in its preseason opener vs. Phoenix last season on May 3 marked a franchise record for points scored in a preseason game. Seattle defeated Phoenix, 86-64, led by 15 points apiece from Sami Whitcomb and Carolyn Swords.
- The Storm is 19-26 all-time in preseason play, including 12-9 at KeyArena. Seattle's first preseason game at KeyArena took place on May 13, 2000 when the Storm dropped a 70-63 outcome vs. Utah.
- While it is preseason play, today's contest is a rematch of last season's first-round showdown of the WNBA Playoffs. The Storm fell to the Mercury, 79-69, despite a playoff career high of 23 points from Breanna Stewart.
- The Storm will play Phoenix on May 20 on Opening Night presented by Swedish, with a 6 p.m. PT tipoff at KeyArena.
- Today marks Dan Hughes' first preseason game with the Seattle Storm. Hughes was named head coach in early October.

## 2017 REGULAR SEASON RESULTS VS. PHOENIX

### Seattle 71, Phoenix 75 - KeyArena (8/27/17)

The Seattle Storm (14-18) hosted the Phoenix Mercury (16-16) on Sunday night, creating a showdown of two teams jostling for playoff positioning. Led by Brittney Griner and Diana Taurasi, Phoenix grinded its way to a 75-71 win on the road. Jewell Loyd emerged to score 33 points, a new career-high for the Storm guard. Breanna Stewart finished one rebound away from a double-double at 13 points and nine rebounds. Sue Bird chopped the gap between her and Ticha Penicheiro in half, dishing three assists to put her just three away from the WNBA record. Loyd scored the first five points of the game for Seattle as the team made just 2-for-8 of its shots in the opening minutes. A low-scoring first quarter ended with Seattle hugging a 14-13 lead. Loyd led all scorers with nine points, while Griner scooped in eight first-quarter points for the Mercury. Seattle forced the visitors into four turnovers in the first ten minutes. Both teams struggled to get the ball in the hole. Led by Loyd, the Storm went 4-for-16 from the field in the first frame while Phoenix shot 5-for-18. Phoenix took a slim 36-34 lead into halftime. Loyd's 15 points led all players at the break, with Griner right behind at 14. Bird snagged the first points of the second half by stroking a three from the top of the key, giving Seattle a 37-36 advantage. Halftime seemed to cool down the Mercury, as the team went scoreless for nearly half of the third quarter. By the time Griner hooked in Phoenix's first points of the second half, 4:58 had already elapsed off the third quarter clock. Brondello signaled for a timeout shortly after, standing under a scoreboard that read 43-41 in favor of the home team. She gave the team a lead, and her 11th point of the night, on the very next trip down the floor. Loyd sunk a fadeaway off Bird's third assist to tie the game at 45, then hit a nasty step back to give the team a 47-45 lead moments later. At the end of three highly-contested, defensive-minded quarters, Phoenix had a 51-49 lead. After falling behind briefly, Loyd put her team back ahead on a midrange J with the scoreboard showing 2:44. On arguably the biggest possession of the game, Griner undid a 66-66 tie with a hoop and harm under the basket, pushing Phoenix ahead by three. Loyd answered with an and-one of her own on the ensuing possession before Leilani Mitchell knocked in a momentous three-point bomb. Mitchell's deep ball meant Phoenix had a 72-69 lead with 44.6 seconds to play. The Mercury were able to close the deal down the stretch, thanks to a big three from Taurasi, eventually winning 75-71.

### Seattle 98, Phoenix 89 - KeyArena (8/12/17)

The Seattle Storm (11-16) made its only trip to the desert this season, playing a Saturday night road game against the Phoenix Mercury (14-13). Seattle was playing its first game under interim coach Gary Kloppenburg, and the Storm responded with one of its best offensive outings of the season, winning 98-89 on Phoenix's home court. The duo of Breanna Stewart and Jewell Loyd combined for 40 points, with each player scoring 20. Crystal Langhorne flexed her way to 19 points on 8-for-9 shooting numbers. Alysha Clark played one of her best games of 2017, putting up 13 points, five rebounds and a 15 +/- rating in 21 minutes of playing time. Seattle's bench exploded for 23 points on 8-for-16 shooting, led by six points each from Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis and Sami Whitcomb. Four players dished out five assists for the Storm, marking a franchise first. Stewart gave Seattle its first points of the second frame with a pull up jumper at 7:07, layup at the quarter's 4:43 point to give the road team its biggest lead of the half (46-40). At halftime, the teams were deadlocked at 53. Seattle put on a shooting display, making 55.6 percent (20-for-36) of its first half field goals. Seattle stacked up 15 assists on its initial 20 made field goals. Clark rattled home a three early in the third quarter, serving as Seattle's first points of the second half and snapping a streak of seven misses in eight shots. Taurasi buried a shot from three-point range four minutes into the third quarter, raising the Mercury lead to a game-high seven points (66-59). The Storm answered with a mini 7-2 run to get within two points as the third quarter clock melted away. Ramu Tokashiki knocked home a jump shot to supply Seattle with a four-point lead (72-68) in the quarter's waning moments. Three fourths of the way through the game, Seattle had a 78-74 lead. Mosqueda-Lewis sank Seattle's 10th three of the night to push the Storm's lead to seven. On its next possession, Stewart banked in a leaning shot in the lane, extending the lead to nine (86-77) and capping an 8-0 run. That run would grow to 10-0 before Taurasi put a stop to it with a baseline J. With five minutes to go Seattle owned a 90-84 edge. Phoenix went scoreless until the 44-second mark, at which point Seattle had a 98-87 lead. The Mercury mustered two more garbage time points before the game ended, with Seattle on top 98-89. The win at Talking Stick Arena was Seattle's first road victory since July 1.

### Seattle 82, Phoenix 85 - KeyArena (6/23/17)

The Seattle Storm nearly overcame an 11-point, second-half deficit but ultimately dropped an 85-82 heartbreaker to the Phoenix Mercury on Friday night for Pride Tipoff at KeyArena. Between the inside play of Brittney Griner and outside shooting of Diana Taurasi, the Mercury (7-5) notched critical buckets to weather several Storm comeback attempts. The duo ultimately finished with 25 points apiece, including six three's from Taurasi, the WNBA's all-time scoring leader. For the second straight game, Breanna Stewart eclipsed the 20-point mark with 21 points to go along with a team-high eight boards, but it wasn't enough. She certainly had help with Jewell Loyd, who kept Seattle (6-6) in it during the second half, finishing with 18 points and six assists. The second quarter was back and forth, featuring six lead changes in the opening five minutes. A three by Sue Bird capped a 5-0 Storm run to make it 32-31. Seattle with 6:38 left in the half, but Yvonne Turner scored inside to put Phoenix back up one, and the Mercury kept that advantage for the next five minutes thanks in large part to Taurasi. The Mercury stretched the gap to 11 (57-46) and potentially could've made it worse if it hadn't been for Loyd, who scored Seattle's first 10 points of the second half. A three by Bird cut the deficit to three (59-56), but Griner scored seven of the Mercury's next 13 to push it back to nine (72-63). Stewart's three made it a five-point (75-70) contest, and Seattle later pulled to within three (77-74) midway through the fourth with buckets by Alysha Clark and Crystal Langhorne. The Storm had its chances to tie the game but couldn't seem to get over the hump. Defensive stops helped Seattle claw its way back in one more time, and two free throws by Loyd cut the margin to three (85-82) at the 32.5 mark. On the Mercury's next possession, Taurasi got whistled for an offensive foul, giving the Storm a chance to send the game into overtime. After a jump ball, Seattle retained possession with 3.6 seconds left and got a decent look, but Sami Whitcomb's three at the buzzer came up short.

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## LAST GAME

### Seattle 69, Phoenix 79 - Wells Fargo Arena (9/6/17) - 2017 WNBA Playoffs (First Round)

The No. 8 seed Seattle Storm (15-19) descended upon Wells Fargo Arena on Wednesday night for a single-elimination playoff bout with the No. 5 seed Phoenix Mercury (18-16). Starting the game on a 22-16 run, Seattle would get outscored 63-47 the rest of the way, losing to its longtime Western Conference rival. Playing in her second career playoff game, Breanna Stewart tallied 23 points on 6-for-17 shooting. Jewell Loyd compiled a 28.6 field goal percentage (4-for-14), but knocked in all seven of her free throws to finish with 17 points. The Storm had a rough night scoring the rock. Seattle was 22-for-63 (34.9 field goal percentage), and received just eight points combined from Crystal Langhorne and Alysha Clark. Sami Whitcomb gave Seattle a six-point lead (22-16) in the primary stages of the second quarter with a ceiling-scrapping three from the wing. ## PREVIOUS GAME

### Seattle 85, Chicago 80 - Allstate Arena (9/3/17)

The Seattle Storm's dynamic duo of Breanna Stewart and Jewell Loyd combined to score 54 points and help Seattle overcome a 10-point, fourth-quarter deficit en route to sealing an 85-80 road win at Chicago to cap the 2017 regular season. Seattle (15-19) issued a stifling defensive effort in the fourth quarter to get the job done, holding Chicago to a 29.4 shooting percentage in the final 10 minutes, and the Storm outscored the Sky by 13 (24-11) at the free throw line in tonight's outing. Stewart's 29-point performance marked her 21st game this season with 20 points or more, breaking Lauren Jackson's record of 20 set in 2003. Loyd lit up the stat sheet as well, recording 25 points on 8-for-16 shooting to go along with five assists. Crystal Langhorne logged her fourth double-double of the year with 13 points and a season-high 12 boards, while Noelle Quinn directed the Storm offense with seven dimes. Both teams got off to hot starts offensively, combining to shoot over 68 percent in the opening five minutes. Stewart netted nine of Seattle's first 19 points to lead the Storm to a 19-18 advantage at the media timeout of the first frame. A Langhorne and-one at the 3:29 mark scooted Seattle's lead to four (22-18), but Chicago responded with a 7-0 run to go up by three (25-22) after a triple by Courtney Vandersloot. Anchored by 14-combined points between Vandersloot and Allie Quigley, the Sky ultimately took a 29-26 advantage into the second stanza. The third stanza was back and forth early on, as Stewart pushed Seattle to a 58-54 advantage at the 5:47 mark with a layup on a feed from Quinn. Chicago went back in front by one (61-60) before Loyd connected on a three and Swords nailed another jumper to cap a 5-0 Storm run with 2:40 left in the quarter, and Chicago managed to muster an 8-1 burst to crawl to a 69-66 lead at the conclusion of the period. Despite hanging around, Seattle never could get over the hump in the early stages of the final frame, pulling within one twice before Chicago extended the advantage to 10 (78-68) after a three by Jordan Hooper, forcing a Storm timeout at the 5:50 mark. The Sky, playing for pride alone, notched some momentum thanks to a big-time block by Vandersloot, who proceeded to net a layup for her 15th point on the night a mere 1:26 later. But between the one-two punch of Stewart and Loyd, Seattle clawed its way back, booking 11 unanswered, including a three by Loyd to put the Storm back in front 79-78 with 3:11 left to play. After a Quigley bucket, Stewart connected on a jumper for her 27th point of the night at the 1:49 mark, and despite getting a stop on its next possession, the Storm coughed up a turnover to give Chicago another chance. Vandersloot got the look Chicago wanted on a cut to the hoop for a layup, but the Sky came up empty, and Stewart and Quinn drilled free throws down the stretch to seal it.

The No. 8 seed Seattle Storm (15-19) descended upon Wells Fargo Arena on Wednesday night for a single-elimination playoff bout with the No. 5 seed Phoenix Mercury (18-16). Starting the game on a 22-16 run, Seattle would get outscored 63-47 the rest of the way, losing to its longtime Western Conference rival. Playing in her second career playoff game, Breanna Stewart tallied 23 points on 6-for-17 shooting. Jewell Loyd compiled a 28.6 field goal percentage (4-for-14), but knocked in all seven of her free throws to finish with 17 points. The Storm had a rough night scoring the rock. Seattle was 22-for-63 (34.9 field goal percentage), and received just eight points combined from Crystal Langhorne and Alysha Clark. Sami Whitcomb gave Seattle a six-point lead (22-16) in the primary stages of the second quarter with a ceiling-scrapping three from the wing. ## BIRD: FLYIN' UP THE RECORD BOOKS

In 2017, Sue Bird moved up two spots in the all-time rankings for points. With a 10-point performance at San Antonio on June 6, Bird passed Katie Douglas to climb to 10th, and she netted 11 at Indiana on June 9 to pass DeLisha Milton-Jones to scoot to No. 9. She has 5,840 career points, needing 160 more to become the eighth player in WNBA history to eclipse the 6,000-point mark.

### SEATTLE'S FG QUEEN

With three made field goals at Los Angeles on July 25, 2017, Bird became the Storm's all-time leader in field goals made with 2,091, passing Lauren Jackson (2,090). Not only did Bird pass Jackson in the franchise rankings, she also passed the Aussie on the WNBA's all-time rankings, moving to No. 8.

### THE ALL-TIME BEST DISHIN' THE ROCK

At age 37, Bird is the WNBA's all-time assist leader with 2,610 dimes. She passed Ticha Penicheiro (2,599) on Sept. 1, 2017 at Washington and averaged a career-best 6.6 assists per game last season, finishing tied for second in the WNBA. In 2016, she averaged a league-best 5.8 en route to earning the WNBA Peak Performer award.

### STEWIE'S 20 & 10

Breanna Stewart recorded seven games with at least 20 points and 10 rebounds during the 2017 season, with her most recent performance coming on July 18 vs. Chicago, where she scored 25 points to go along with 11 rebounds. On July 1, 2017 she posted a 30-point, 10-board double-double at Dallas. As a rookie in 2016, Stewart eclipsed the 20-10 mark twice, and she now has 21 career double-doubles to rank third all-time in Storm history (Lauren Jackson, 76; Sue Bird, 23).

## ROOKIES HEAD WEST

In the 2018 WNBA Draft presented by State Farm, the Storm snagged Jordin Canada (5th pick, UCLA) and Teana Muldrow (29th pick, West Virginia). Canada (831 dimes) left UCLA and the Pac-12 as the all-time assists leader, while Muldrow averaged over 18 points per game in her final year as a Mountie. Seattle also signed four players to training camp contracts: Aleksandra Crvendakic (6-2 forward, Serbia), Brittany McPhee (6-0 guard, Stanford), Khaalia Hillsman (6-5 center, Texas A&M) and Emily Potter (6-6 center, Utah)

## NEW FACES → STRONGER INTERIOR

The Storm's roster saw quite a few changes in the offseason, with the biggest movements coming in the paint. Seattle signed Courtney Paris, a 6-4 center and two-time WNBA rebounding peak performer, and later acquired another versatile, athletic forward in Natasha Howard, who won a championship with the Minnesota Lynx in 2017. The Storm desperately needed a boost on the glass after the team finished second to last in the WNBA in rebounds per game (31.0) during the 2017 season.

## THE RACE TO 6,000

Let the countdown begin. Sue Bird sits only 160 points away from 6,000, which would make the 10-time All-Star just the eighth player in WNBA history to reach the milestone. She currently ranks ninth on the league's all-time scoring list. In 2017, she averaged 10.6 points per game to go along with a career-best 6.6 assists per contest. Bird's career-best effort came during her rookie season when she exploded for 33 points against Portland on Aug. 9, 2002, and she has tallied a career-average of 12.2 points per game.

## STEWIE'S 3RD-YEAR DOMINANCE

It was quite the third WNBA season for Breanna Stewart in 2017, who finished second in the league in scoring with 19.9 points per game en route to collecting her first bid as an All-Star. A two-time WNBA player of the week in 2017, Stewart became the fastest player to reach 1,000 points and 500 rebounds, doing it in just 55 games. She broke the Storm's single-season record for 20-point games with 21, besting Lauren Jackson's mark of 20 set in 2003, and she also finished sixth in the WNBA in boards with 8.7 per affair.

## CRYSTAL CLEAR VISION

Call her Ms. Consistency, Crystal Langhorne made big strides in 2017 she broke her own single-season field goal percentage with a 64.7 percent (68-for-109) clip. She had two perfect games a year ago, going 9-for-9 vs. Atlanta on July 15 and 5-for-5 vs. Connecticut on July 12). Her 9-for-9 effort was a Storm record for most makes without a miss, and at one point she made 21-straight shots in a span of three games. Langhorne now holds each of the top four franchise records (63% in 2016, 57.1% in 2014, 54.5% in 2015).

## JEWELL SHINES IN 2017

Jewell Loyd got off to one of the hottest starts in Storm history to open the 2017 season, totaling 78 points in the first three games. She averaged a career-best 17.7 points per contest last season, including a career-high 33 points vs. Phoenix on Aug. 27, 2017. To tip off 2017, Loyd scored at least 25 points in each of the first three games, all of which she accomplished on 55.6 percent shooting or better. Loyd hit at least 10 field goals five times in 2017, and she ultimately registered nine 25-point games during her fourth pro season.

## STORM TRIO JOINS 1,000-POINT CLUB

Joining the 1,000-point club became contagious in 2017, as Jewell Loyd, Alysha Clark and Breanna Stewart all reached the feat. Loyd tallied her 1,000th point on a crossover jumper vs. Washington on May 21, and then Clark accomplished the same challenge on July 1 at Dallas via a three-pointer. Stewart's 1,000th point took place on July 25 at Los Angeles, and she ultimately grabbed her 500th rebound in the next outing against Dallas to make WNBA history as the fastest player to reach 1,000 points and 500 boards.



## STEWIE: BY THE #'S

Breanna Stewart broke the Storm's franchise record for 20-point performances in a single season with her 21st 20-point game on Sept. 3 at Chicago, totaling 29 points on 9-for-17 shooting. She bested Lauren Jackson's 2003 tally of 20 games with 20 points or more. At one point, Stewart recorded 12-straight 20-plus point games in 2017, one shy of Diana Taurasi's WNBA record of 13.

## STEWIE: SEATTLE'S SINGLE-SEASON RECORD HOLDER FOR 20-POINT GAMES

## 1-2 PUNCH OF STEWIE, JEWELL

Seattle became the first team to ever notch back-to-back Rookie of the Year honorees in Jewell Loyd (2015) and Breanna Stewart (2016). During the 2017 season, the duo made Seattle one of only three (Phoenix, Los Angeles) teams in the WNBA to boast at least two players in the top 10 in scoring. Stewart, a four-time NCAA national champion at UCONN, finished second in the league with 19.9 points per game, while Loyd ranked ninth with a 17.7 points per game average, a career-best effort for the former Notre Dame standout.

## WHITCOMB RETURNS TO EMERALD CITY

A former University of Washington sharpshooter, Sami Whitcomb made her triumphant return to Seattle during the 2017 season. She battled through training camp en route to earning a spot on the 12-player roster and emerged as one of the deadliest shooters in the league, as New York discovered on May 26, 2017, when Whitcomb scored 22 second-half points en route to setting a Storm record for most three's in a half (6), also tying a WNBA record set by Diana Taurasi. In her WNBA debut, Whitcomb averaged 4.5 points per game.

## REPPIN' SEATTLE AMONGST THE BEST

Both Sue Bird and Breanna Stewart represented the Seattle Storm at Verizon WNBA All-Star 2017, the first-ever All-Star game hosted by Seattle. For Bird, it marked her 10th appearance, tying the league's all-time record held by Tamika Catchings. Bird was named a starter for the eighth time, participated in the three-point contest at halftime and finished with an All-Star record 11 assists. Stewart made her inaugural All-Star debut, tallying nine points and six rebounds off the bench en route to a 130-121 victory over the East.





## TEAM NOTES

### EVEN STEVENS

Seattle holds an all-time record of 5-5 vs. the Phoenix Mercury in preseason play. The Storm first squared off against the Mercury on May 8, 2004, dropping an 83-44 decision at Phoenix, the worst preseason loss in franchise history. That game was also the professional debut of Diana Taurasi, the league's all-time leading scorer, who recorded 12 points in 21 minutes of action. The Storm ultimately got revenge that same year with an 82-72 triumph, snapping a six-game losing skid in preseason play.

### LUCKY NO. 13

In 2017, Seattle booked its 13th playoff appearance in franchise history as the No. 8 seed. This also marked the Storm's second postseason appearance in a row. Despite a late comeback effort, Seattle fell to fifth-seeded Phoenix, 79-69, in the first round at Wells Fargo Arena in Tempe, Ariz. The Storm fell to 1-3 all-time on the road at Phoenix in WNBA postseason play, as Breanna Stewart scored a playoff career-high 23 points in the losing effort. Seattle has mustered two WNBA championships in its history, coming in 2004 and 2010.

### HASHTAG #WINNING

Seattle will have a total of five games live-streamed on Twitter, including the team's home opener on May 20 vs. Phoenix at 7 p.m. PT, the first-ever home game for the Storm to be live-streamed on Twitter. The Storm boasts the most of any team in the WNBA, which announced the list of 20 games on May 2. During its inaugural season on Twitter, the WNBA averaged 613,000 unique viewers per game for its 20-game schedule. The remaining Storm Twitter games are: 5/29 vs. WAS, 6/19 vs. LVA, 6/10 vs. LAS and 7/31 at PHO.

### NEW COACHES, NEW ERA

On Oct. 4, 2017 the Storm announced that Dan Hughes, who sits third all-time in the WNBA for career wins and first in games, would become head coach in Seattle. Three months later, the franchise revealed that nine-year WNBA veteran Crystal Robinson would join the sidelines as an assistant. In addition to Hughes and Robinson, the coaching staff features Gary Kloppenburg, who has served as an assistant coach for the last two seasons, and Ryan Webb, who will oversee player development in 2018.

### ROAD WARRIORS

It's safe to say that the early portion of the Storm's schedule is 'home heavy.' However, in the last two months (July-Aug.) of the regular season, Seattle will travel a total of over 26,369 miles, and that doesn't even include the trips back to the Emerald City. After playing 14 of its first 22 games at KeyArena, the Storm will hit the road for nine of its last 12 outings. The team's mental toughness will certainly be tested, as Seattle looks to beat last year's road mark of 5-12 (Storm hasn't finished above .500 in road games since 2010 at 11-6).

### GLANCE TO LAST (PRE) SEASON

In last season's preseason opener vs. Phoenix on May 3, the Storm racked up 86 points en route to setting a franchise record for the most points tallied in a preseason game. After leading by only eight (39-31) at halftime, Seattle shot 51.3 percent (20-for-39) in the second half and outscored the Mercury by 14 in the final 20 minutes to seal an 86-64 victory. Seattle currently sits at 19-26 in preseason games, including a 12-9 mark at KeyArena. This marks the fourth straight season that Seattle is facing Phoenix twice during preseason play.

# DAN HUGHES

Dan Hughes was named the Seattle Storm's sixth head coach in franchise history on Oct. 4, 2017. Hughes, who sits third all-time in career wins with 237, was twice named WNBA Coach of the Year, first in 2001, after guiding the Cleveland Rockers to a 22-10 mark, and again in 2007, after posting a 20-14 record with San Antonio. He guided the Stars to the WNBA Finals in 2008, losing to Detroit.

While Hughes' two Coach of the Year honors and 10 career postseason appearances highlight his coaching achievements, his players have been just as successful. In the WNBA, Hughes has produced 17 All-Star selections, six All-Rookie Team honorees, four All-WNBA First Team selections, seven Second Team products and a quartet of All-Defensive Team honorees.

Hughes spent 11 years as the head coach and general manager for San Antonio, 2005-09, and 2011-16, guiding the Stars to six postseason appearances. Prior to San Antonio, he led the Cleveland Rockers from 2000-03, and was elevated to head coach in Charlotte midway through the 1999 season, posting a 10-10 record for the Sting. With those three franchises, Hughes made 10 playoff appearances in 16 total seasons, including one WNBA Finals showing in 2008 with San Antonio.

Hughes' coaching tree is deep in the WNBA, with three WNBA western conference head coaches and two coaches having served under him as an assistant. Minnesota's Cheryl Reeve worked with Hughes in Cleveland in 2003, Los Angeles' Brian Agler was on Hughes' staff in San Antonio from 2005-07 and Phoenix's Sandy Brondello was also with Hughes' San Antonio staff from 2005-09. James Wade, currently an assistant for Reeve in Minnesota, spent 2013-16 with Hughes in San Antonio. Las Vegas assistant Vickie Johnson, who played for Hughes at San Antonio from 2006-09, was as assistant under Hughes from 2011-16.

Prior to the WNBA, he served as the assistant coach for the University of Toledo's women's basketball program (1996-97) and men's basketball program (1991-96). During his tenure with the Rockets' women's hoops team, Toledo posted a 27-4 record, winning the Mid-American Conference (MAC) Championship and notching an NCAA Tournament appearance. Hughes also served assistant coaching roles with the men's basketball teams at Mount Union College (1982-84 and 1985-91) and Baldwin-Wallace College (1984-85).

During the 1977-78 campaign, Hughes served as a graduate assistant at Miami of Ohio, helping the RedHawks to a MAC Championship and an appearance in the NCAA Regionals.

In 1977, Hughes graduated with a degree in physical education and history from Muskingum College in New Concord, Ohio. He went on to collect a Master's Degree in education from Miami University of Ohio in 1978. Hughes and his wife, Mary, have two children, Bryce and Sara.
