TERESA WEATHERSPOON

Head Coach

Teresa Weatherspoon was selected No. 10 overall to New York in the WNBA's inaugural draft in 1997. She then spent a legendary eight-year career in the league, with her first seven seasons with New York (1997-2003) and her final year with Los Angeles (2004). She led the Liberty to the first-ever WNBA Finals in 1997 and 1999. Weatherspoon is No. 2 on the Liberty's All-Time Minutes played list (6,842), No. 1 All-Time Assists (1,306) and No. 1 in All-Time Steals (453) for the franchise. She returned to New York as the Liberty's first Director of Player and Franchise Development from 2015 to 2019.

In 2016, she was named to the league's Top-20 best and most influential players in WNBA history. She is a five-time WNBA All-Star Starter (1999-2003), four-time All-WNBA Second Team (1997-2000), two-time WNBA Defensive Player of the Year (1997-98) — the first WNBA player ever to be

named DPOY in 1997 — league leader in Assists and Steals in 1997, WNBA All-Decade Team Honorable Mention (2006) and named to WNBA Top-15 players (2011).

Weatherspoon has been inducted to five Hall of Fames, including the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame (2019), Texas Sports Hall of Fame (2020), Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame (2010), Women's Basketball Hall of Fame (2010) and the Louisiana Tech Athletic Hall of Fame (1995).

Internationally, the Pineland, Texas native is also a two-time Olympic Games medalist, earning Gold in 1988 and Bronze in 1992 with Team USA. She also spent six years of playing career in Italy, where she was named a six-time Italian League All-Star (1989-94) and a two-time Russian League Champion (1995-96).

Weatherspoon joins the Sky with well over a decade of coaching experience. She began her coaching career in 2007 as head coach of the Westchester Phantoms of the American Basketball Association.

In 2008, she joined the coaching staff at Louisiana Tech and was promoted to head coach in 2009. She led her alma mater to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances (2010-11), a Western Athletic Conference Tournament title (2010) and a WAC regular-season championship (2009, 2011). The two-time All-American tallied a 99-71 record as the Lady Techsters' head coach.

She also led Louisiana Tech to an NCAA Championship as a player in 1988 and is the No. 1 All-Time Assist leader in school history (958). Her No. 11 jersey is now retired at LA Tech. On September 20, 2023, Weatherspoon was one of six LA Tech legends to be honored with a statue at the school.

Most recently, the New Orleans Pelicans hired Weatherspoon as a two-way player development coach in 2019 and stayed on the coaching staff as an assistant until 2023.

SYDNEY JOHNSON

Assistant Coach

The Sky hired Sydney Johnson as assistant coach on Feb. 26. Johnson served as the head coach of USA Basketball's 3×3 U23 World Cup Team in September 2023. He was also head coach of the 3×3 Men's U23 Nations League Team in July 2023. Johnson began his coaching career as an assistant at Georgetown University from 2004-07, where he helped the Hoyas to their first Final Four in 22 years in 2007. In 2007, Johnson led Princeton to an Ivy League Championship. Johnson took over as head coach of Fairfield University in 2011. He recorded the most postseason appearances in school history (four), most postseason victories in school history (three) and tied for the second-most winning seasons (five) in program history.



CRYSTAL ROBINSON

Assistant Coach

The Sky hired Crystal Robinson as assistant coach on Feb. 20. Robinson has over a decade of coaching experience after serving as assistant coach with Phoenix (2022), then previously with Washington (2007), Seattle (2018) — where she won a WNBA Championship with the Storm — and Dallas (2019). Her coaching experience also includes roles at McAlester High School in her hometown of Oklahoma (2009-10), where she guided the Lady Buffaloes to a 5A Oklahoma State title in her only season at the helm. She then became head coach Murray State College (2010-13), where she cemented a 79-37 overall coaching record with the Lady Aggies. Prior to her coaching career, Robinson played at Southeastern Oklahoma State University.



TAMERA YOUNG

Assistant Coach

The Sky hired Tamera “Ty” Young as assistant coach on April 17. Young returns to the organization after playing nine years in Chicago out of a storied 12-year career in the league as the third-longest tenured player in Sky history. She ranks in the top 10 in Sky history in 10 overall categories: 250 games played (No. 3), 211 steals (No. 4), 1,815 total points (No. 9), 340 assists (No. 7), 286 offensive rebounds (No. 3), 678 defensive rebounds (No. 4), 964 total rebounds (No. 4), 340 assists (No. 7), 724 field goals made (No. 7) and 41.1% field goal percentage (No. 9). Young was previously drafted No. 8 overall by Atlanta in the 2008 WNBA Draft and then played for Las Vegas from 2018-19 after nine seasons in Chicago from 2009-17 and retired from playing in 2019.

HOMECOMINGS

Diamond DeShields is returning to Chicago after spending the first four years of her career with the Sky. She was an All-Star in 2019 after averaging 16.2 points, 5.5 rebounds, 2.4 assists and 1.3 steals. For her efforts, she was also named to the All-WNBA Second Team. Two years later, DeShields helped lead the Sky to their first-ever championship in 2021, averaging 11.3 points in the regular season and 5.5 points during the playoff run. She was traded to Phoenix in 2022, missed the 2023 season with an injury, and then signed with the Sky in 2024. For the first time since 2021, DeShields will be suiting up for Chicago and returning as a veteran leader after entering the franchise as the No. 3 overall pick in 2018.

Kysre Gondrezick originally signed with the Sky in 2022 on a training camp contract but didn't ultimately make the team. She signed to a training camp contract again this year and appeared in both of the Sky's preseason games, which included a franchise-best preseason win over New York on May 7. In that game, Gondrezick recorded nine points and made three three-pointers. For her efforts, she made the Sky's opening roster and will look to suit up for a WNBA game for the first time since 2021, when she played for Indiana as a rookie.

CLASS IS IN SESSION

The Sky drafted **Kamilla Cardoso** and **Angel Reese** in the 2024 draft, selecting Cardoso with the third overall pick in the draft and using the seventh overall pick to take Reese. Two of the most prolific collegiate players of all time, Cardoso and Reese were the first Sky first rounders since 2021. Cardoso was the Sky's first lottery pick since 2019, when the team selected Katie Lou Samuelson with the fourth overall pick. This is also the first time since 2018 where the Sky made two first round picks – the last time the Sky did so, they selected Diamond DeShields and Gabby Williams. Cardoso scored six points, four rebounds, an assist, a steal and two blocks in the Sky's first preseason game on May 3 against Minnesota. Reese scored 13 points, nine rebounds, an assist, two steals and a block in the same game before recording 13 points, five rebounds and two steals in the Sky's second preseason game against New York. Reese started both preseason games and is aiming to be the first Sky first rounder since DeShields and Williams to start in the season opener/their WNBA debut.

BUILDING ON CAREER YEARS

Elizabeth Williams, Marina Mabrey and Dana Evans return to the Sky after having career years with the franchise in 2023 and helping lead Chicago to the postseason.

Williams averaged a career highs of 2.5 assists and 1.3 per game to go along with 9.8 points, 5.8 rebounds and 1.5 blocks per game. Her points average was her most since 2020, her rebounds and her blocks were her most since 2019. The epitome of consistency for the Sky, Williams appeared in and started in all 40 regular season games with the Sky, along with both postseason games. Alongside Courtney Williams, Elizabeth Williams' 42 total games played in 2023 are the most in franchise history (the WNBA expanded its number of games in a regular season to 40 in 2023). Due to her 2.8 stocks per game (blocks + steals) and her overall perimeter and interior defense, Williams earned a nod to the WNBA's All-Defensive Second Team.

Mabrey averaged a career-high 15.0 points per game across 39 games (all starts) with the Sky in 2023. After being traded to Chicago in the 2023 offseason, Mabrey implemented herself as a crucial member of the Sky's lineup. She finished 2023 as the team's second-leading scorer while shooting 39.0% from beyond the arc on 5.8 attempts per game. Mabrey recorded a career-high and franchise-record 89 three-pointers in 2023, beating the team's previous record held by Allie Quigley (80 in 2019). This season, Mabrey will look to continue on her career year in 2023 and, alongside Evans, may be one of the Sky's lead ball-handlers.

Evans improved in her third season with the Sky, posting career highs in minutes, points, rebounds, assists, steals and blocks. She averaged 9.0 points and 3.0 assists off the bench for the Sky in 2023, finishing third in Sixth Player of the Year voting. She was tremendous in the Sky's two playoff games against the eventual-champion Las Vegas Aces, recording 14.5 points, 3.5 assists and 1.5 steals in two games. At 25 years old, Evans is in good position to once again top her career-high averages for the third straight season.

DON'T CALL IT A COMEBACK

Isabelle Harrison signed with the Sky in 2023 but didn't appear in a regular season game after suffering an injury. With an offseason of recovery under her belt, Harrison is primed to help the Sky reach the playoffs again in 2024. A six-year WNBA veteran, Harrison holds career averages of 8.6 points and 4.9 rebounds. This offseason, she suited up for Athletes Unlimited and ended up with a 40-point performance in one of her games.

Chennedy Carter signed with the Sky on a training camp deal in 2024 after not appearing in a WNBA game during the 2023 season. A former fourth overall pick, Carter is a young, high-scoring player who finished second in Rookie of the Year voting in 2020 after averaging 17.4 points and 3.4 assists. Carter played in both China and Turkey during the WNBA offseason, putting up a 50-point game in China. She made the Sky's opening day roster after a pair of preseason appearances.

OUTSIDE HELP

In the 2024 offseason, the Sky signed **Lindsay Allen** before acquiring **Michaela Onyenwere** and **Brianna Turner** via trade.

Allen is a six-year WNBA veteran with lead guard skills who can help take the Sky to the next level in 2024. In her last two seasons (with Minnesota), Allen averaged 6.3 points and 4.4 assists across 38 games and 20 starts. She played with Botas in Turkey during the WNBA offseason, stuffing the stat sheet with near-triple-double performances on a nightly basis. With the Sky having a younger team in 2024, Allen is set to provide a stable presence in the backcourt.

Onyenwere is just a handful of seasons removed from winning WNBA Rookie of the Year in 2021 and she had her best statistical season at age 23 with Phoenix last season. Acquired alongside Turner in the trade that sent Kahleah Copper to the Mercury, Onyenwere is primed to take a significant role on the wing. She averaged 8.9 points and 3.7 rebounds in 2023 and suited up for Ormanspor in Turkey during the WNBA offseason.

Turner joins the Sky after spending the first five seasons of her career in Phoenix. A defensive technician, Turner holds two career appearances on the WNBA's All-Defensive First Team (2020 and 2021). She holds career averages of 5.2 points, 7.0 rebounds, 1.3 blocks and 0.9 steals per game while connecting on 58.2% of her shots from the field.

THE QUEST FOR TITLE NO. 2

The Sky hired head coach **Teresa Weatherspoon** this offseason, a WNBA legend making her league head coaching debut. Chicago also hired **Sydney Johnson**, **Crystal Robinson** and **Tamera "Ty" Young** as assistant coaches. Johnson and Young are making their WNBA coaching debuts. Robinson holds WNBA coaching experience through assistant positions with Washington, Seattle, Dallas and Phoenix.

Chicago made the playoffs for the fifth straight season in 2023 and is looking to make it a sixth straight this season.

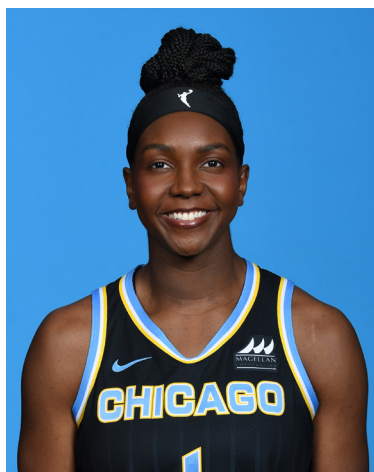
